We will be joined during our Finale by the founder of our NJ Friends of Clearwater Festival, Bob Killian.



Bob Killian Forty years ago, Bob Killian founded NJ Friends of Clearwater's Annual Festival. He plays guitar, banjo, harmonica, penny whistle and Indian flute and he sings folk, country, American standards and original songs. Besides his numerous appearances on national television and radio, he recorded and performed with Peter, Paul & Mary, Pete Seeger, and Tom Chapin. He has also shared the stage with Bruce Springsteen, Bill Monroe, Doc Watson, Earl Scruggs and many others. He recorded his song, "There'll Come A Day" on Pete Seeger's Grammy-winning album, Tomorrow's Children. He also released a live recording, "Killian: Songs For Kids" on the Windsong label. The sound recording from his video "I Like the Jersey Shore" was chosen by the NJ State Dept. of Travel & Tourism to promote the Jersey Shore, and he won the Garden State Music Award for Best Revival Folk Artist. He now resides in Florida, and we are delighted that he decided to join us to celebrate the 40th Anniversary of our - his - NJ Friends of Clearwater Annual Festival. He will join the Circle of Song during our Finale (and maybe before), besides performing a set on our Main Stage.

As one of The Hudson River Sloop Singers who were brought together by Pete Seeger, Jan contributes his rich, deep voice to festivals, gatherings and the Sloop Singer CD, Broad Old River. Jan is a songwriter. One of his songs, "The Ghost of Ellis Island," has become a teaching tool on American immigration in schools. Jan is also a member of The New York Packet, South Street Seaport's official maritime music group, helping to share the history and legacy of the tall ships, and the songs that moved them.

Circle Round the Sun is the folk/acoustic group of Marie Trontell and Jay Wilensky. Jay's warm baritone and Marie's rich alto let the group perform an eclectic mix of great acoustic songs with a special emphasis on duets and sensuous harmonies. Lydia is passionate about singing and connecting with folks through improvisational songs, sign language, wry puppets and filling the air with good musical fun. James Durst is a folk music legend who has been quietly traversing the planet as a touring artist since 1965, performing for rapt audiences of all ages in 50 states & DC and more than 200 cities in 45 countries throughout the Americas, Europe, Scandinavia, the Middle East, Southeast Asia, Russia, Azerbaijan, Japan, Korea and, most recently, India and Israel. He draws from a rich, ever-evolving repertoire of distinctive songs, both original and gathered, in some two dozen languages that reflect a global perspective and underscore the interconnectedness we share with all of life, bringing us closer to our world and to each other. He founded Work o' the Weavers (2003-present) and is a founding Lifetime member of Folk Alliance International. He has written some 250 songs, many of which have appeared on his many recordings, as well as an eco-peace world musical, Hue Manatee's Quest; and a three part epic work, A Whaling Trilogy, that has been orchestrated for symphony, chorus and soloists. Cosby Gibson's performances include several hundred events, some international, some for television, radio and other publication. They include the upcoming Folk Alliance International Conference in Toronto, Canada. Cosby's non-profit project "The Flying Song Garden" is a traveling show bringing song and festivity to communities in hardship, such as natural disaster, worksite closure, catastrophe and the like. The project has been accepted by The New York Foundation of the Arts' fiscal sponsorship program. Cosby's exploration of American Settlers in the Northeastern United States has resulted in a four-song series on her new full-length album, "American Dreams." He hopes not merely to entertain, but also to educate, inform, enlighten, incite and inspire. With McMonikers that include Politicow!, Bovine Diddley, Johnny Cash Cow, Elfish Presley, Dennis McJagger & The Rolling Blarney Stones, InSANiTY CLAUS and Gym Doorison, to name seven, Dennis MC Do No Ugh!, according to Spook, is "A farce to be reckoned with."

Sharleen Leahey is a songwriter, singer and guitarist known for speaking truth to power. Her stirring, heartfelt lyrics reflect her early musical influences which include Buffy Sainte-Marie, Phil Ochs and Pete Seeger whose "Where Have All The Flowers Gone?" first inspired her to pick up a guitar.
