

#### PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

#### This year's theme is: STOP PLASTIC POLLUTION, NOW!

Just take a look around your house, your office, the stores and offices you visit, cars, and everywhere to see how plastic has replaced natural or even metallic products. When a plastic reaches its useful life, especially the disposable objects, if it's not recycled it can become a problem on land & in waterways and oceans. Plastic pollution everywhere endangers land, sky, and sea creatures that can consume or get entangled in it.

#### WHAT CAN YOU DO TO PREVENT PLASTIC DEBRIS IN THE OCEAN? The 3 Rs

- REDUCE the amount of trash you produce especially plastic products like cups, straws, containers
- · Choose items you can REUSE over disposable products
- RECYCLE items, instead of disposing of them, to create new products.

When we, as NJFC take one aspect of the whole plastic pollution spectrum, the dangers of plastics in our waterways people ask us:

- **1. Where Does Plastic Debris Originate?** Plastic debris can enter the ocean in a variety of way: From land, trash may be carried to the ocean in rivers or storm and sewage drains, swept from the beach by waves and surf, or blown offshore by winds, especially during heavy storms. Trash may also come from ships or offshore platforms.
- 2. What Does Plastic Debris Look Like? The most recognizable fragments are from plastic six pack holders, bottles, fishing lines and nets and industrial resin pellets, the "raw material" of consumer plastic products. Most samples collected are small fragments less than 1 cm in size. The most disturbing and visible example of this are called plastic vortexes—sometimes incorrectly called garbage patches--which exist in all the oceans.

#### 3. What Kind Of Plastic Is It?

- Plastics that float: Common household items such as milk jugs, plastic bags, and drinking strawsare made of high density & low density polyethylene, and PP polypropylene which are lighter than the water they displace.
- Plastics that sinks: Other commonly used plastic types such as PET, polyethylene
  terephthalate, PVC, polyvinyl chloride, and PS, polystyrene are denser than seawater,
  they likely sink before reaching the open ocean. The properties of plastics appear to
  change over time at sea, possibly due to sun/sea exposure, & biological growth.

NJ Friends of Clearwater networks with many organizations and colleagues on this issue. One, the NOAA Marine Debris Program has supported more than 140 projects across the U.S., while many other organizations are working to raise awareness, clean up marine debris on beaches and in the ocean, and reduce the input of debris into the oceans through "Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle" campaigns.

Public education and action is the best way to prevent debris from entering the ocean now and in the future.



NJFC's Garvey ~ "Pete's Banjo"

#### THE ENVIRONMENTAL SAIL PROGRAM

The Environmental Sail Program (ESP) and its Tuckerton garvey continues its record of being on the water every summer since 1986 and into the future. Our original Tuckerton Garvey Adam Hyler was retired two seasons ago and was donated and delivered to Tuckerton Seaport and Baymen Museum, Tuckerton, NJ on March 30, 2014. Upon delivery, Paul Hart, TSBM Exec Director declared, "We are proud to be the new home for the Adam Hyler. Thank you and all the wonderful folks who have worked so hard to make people aware of their role in the stewardship of our world."

Its replacement, Pete's Banjo was designed, and constructed over a two year period. While the Adam Hyler was a true replica of the centuries' old design and original plank-caulk hull build techniques, the 26 foot Pete's Banjo will follow that design but has been built with modern techniques including fiberglassing the hull to be more maintainable and seaworthy in its role as keystone of our ESP which includes being the flagship for Navesink Sea Scout Ship #5.

The original garveys, used for clamming and oystering because of their shallow draft, were built there before the American Revolution. Its design will allow NJ Clearwater sailors and captains to perform the following ESP initiatives with ease:

- Flagship of Navesink Sea Scout Ship #5 Sailing, Lots of Sailing
- Boat Building and River Rangers
   Nature Tours and Birding on the Navesink
  - Water Testing Oyster Bed Creation And Maintenance

Sailing, Lots of Sailing. Both NJFC volunteers and guests get to sail on the beautiful Navesink River from June through October. To qualify to sail on the Pete's Banjo requires one thing; show up on scheduled weekly sail days. With ample notice, arrangements can be made with the captains to sail for pleasure or purpose on days other than those scheduled. Email: esp@ njclearwater.org or call (732) 784-8547.
